K: Hello.

B: Yes, sir.

K: Look, one, I expect by the end of the day to have an answer who is coming along on this trip to Wisconsin. Is Laird coming?

B: Not that I know of.

K: Has somebody asked Laird?

B: I'll check again and see. As of yesterday there was no answer that I am aware of, but I will check again.

K: Don't press them but I just want an answer so that we can get the right kind of plane.

B: Yeah. There are no Congressmen that I am aware of that have asked to ride, sir.

K: Zablocki told me yesterday, for Christ's sake.

B: Zablocki wants to attend but as far as the last I heard he hadn't .. asked for a ride -- there is no problem if . . .

K: He asked for a ride with me.

B: All right. But that was after. That was *late* last evening.

K: I mean I don't give a God damn.

B: Mr. Secretary, there is no problem. We will put him on the plane. We will follow up with his office.

K: Let's get a bigger plane if necessary.

B: Right. We will.

K: Now, secondly, uh -- we uh -- I want the schedule so that -- if I get to the dinner by 6:00 that's fine.

B: That's how they have got it now.

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K: And that gives me a half hour rest in the Minneapolis hotel and a chance to change.

B: That is what they have done. You've got the full schedule with you. Paul will have it on the airplane.

K: Okay, thirdly, will you call Senator Humphrey, who isn't coming back in town, and tell him I tried to reach him unsuccessfully and I wanted his guidance for my Minneapolis speech. I would like to give a talk about the relationship of morality and practicality and foreign policy. Which may be a little bit philosophical and notoverwhelmingly headline-making, but which will be thoughtful.

B: Uh-huh.

K: And does he think this audience will -- in that context I could get in foreign aid and other things.

B: Right.

K: It's a message I have been wanting to talk about. And what does he think of this?

B: Okay.

K: Or does he think a more standard foreign policy speech would be better. I prefer to do the former.

B: Okay. I will send you a telegram.

K: Okay. And find out whether he is going to be there.

B: Okay.
