**Alleged 'Captor' Tells
Of Seizing Eichmann**

LONDON, June 22 (UPI)—A man who claims to be one of Adolf Eichmann's kidnapers says it was like hunting a monster and finding a mouse, the London American reports today.

The weekly newspaper said it interviewed the man in London this week, but added his name must remain secret. He was identified as "a young Jewish-American."

Asked how the accused Nazi war criminal appeared to him, the man said: "He's not much to look at. I realized he would be much older (than his war-time photographs). But there was a certain image . . . it was like going after a monster and finding a mouse."

The man told the newspaper they found Eichmann hiding in Buenos Aires after a two-year hunt in South America. He was asked what led him and his fellow "volunteers" to Eichmann.

"It was a woman. Jealousy. He had a German mistress, a young girl. He gave her up for another woman. The first woman got in touch with the right people and they were looking for him. We heard he was

alive in Europe years ago. Then we got evidence he was in Brazil. We'd been looking for him all over South America. . . .

"We concentrated on Buenos Aires. We had to be sure we caught the man. He was small, his name had never been checked on him. We watched him. . . . the nose and . . . same as in . . .

went on, that . . . man said, . . . newspaper. . . . Eichmann was in Buenos Aires . . .

along. We . . . the car, and . . . went over to him, and one of them told him in Spanish 'come with us.' He came. No trouble at all.

"He obviously thought we were police. Then it suddenly dawned on him who we were. He was scared stiff. Thought we were going to shoot him there and then," the man said in the interview.

The man said Eichmann was hidden for six days in the home of a Jewish sympathizer, while waiting for an airplane to fly him to Israel.
