SUBJECT:**Daily Report**Information

Meeting with General Evren: In response to your letter, General Evren expressed continued hope for Greek reintegration into NATO, but insisted that Turkey would not agree under any circumstances to a return to the command and control arrangements for the Aegean which existed prior to 1974. Evren noted that some pre-1974 Turkish governments had made mistakes on this issue and were being condemned today because of it, and said he was not going to have the next generation of Turks saying the same thing about him. He expressed appreciation for your sensitivity on the southeastern NATO region, and for your understanding of Turkey itself. Evren, noting that he would reply formally to your letter in the near future, asked that his best wishes and respects -- and those of the Turkish nation -- be conveyed to you. (S)

Japanese Foreign Minister's Meeting with Cy Vance: During discussions in Tokyo with Cy Vance yesterday, Foreign Minister Ito said Japan was finding it increasingly difficult to maintain sanctions against the Soviet Union, particularly in view of recent decisions by France and West Germany to relax their guidelines. Ito offered assurances that Japan would continue "until the U.S. presidential elections" to adhere faithfully to the sanctions guidelines, but he again urged that a meeting of the Allies be called immediately after the elections in order to reinstitute a unified policy. According to Charge Sherman, Ito's statement represents the clearest message delivered so far that Ito expects the U.S. to take the lead after the presidential elections in developing a new Allied consensus on sanctions measures. He adds that it also represents a signal that, in the absence of a unified Allied stance, Japan will not be able to continue to hold to its policy of strict enforcement. (C)

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El Salvador: The junta has responded to our helicopter strategy with a decree directing its security forces to observe a code of human rights, or else lose their own. This is sufficiently close to our proposal that we should begin helicopter training now, and make a final decision about whether there has been sufficient progress by November 30. (S)
